Course Description:

An introduction to research in kinesiology with an emphasis on understanding the research process, including basic statistical knowledge, and its relationship to critical thinking. Practical application of concepts will be encouraged via individual and group projects.

Course Objectives:

To understand the research process and its relationship to critical thinking.

To understand and employ the language and terminology of scholarly research.

To understand the basic concepts of measurement and data analysis, and apply them to

discourse and decision-making.

To apply APA format to written work.

To use Mendeley for referencing articles.

To identify the various forms of research methodology and understand their basic premises.

To critically evaluate research in kinesiology.

To identify the various research programs available in Kinesiology
