Starting Your Adventure!

Your completed application will consist of:

1. An online application
2. Supporting documents (*if applicable*)

The red “**Apply**” button on any program page or the main [Global Learning page](#) will take you to our **Registration & Application for International Study Activity (RAISA)** system, which you access with your UCalgary IT username and password.



Requirements for the Online Application

1. **Statement of Purpose** (per program): This is your chance to explain your intentions and interest for the program you are applying to. Your statement of purpose should be no longer than 500 words. The same statement can be used on other applications but be sure to customize it for each program. Some questions that can help you craft your statement:
 - Why do you want to go to this school or country?
 - How will it help you achieve your academic, professional, and/or personal goals?
 - Why should we select you?
 - How will you fund this experience? (Savings, loans, awards, etc.)
2. **Tentative course list** (per program): Create a list of prospective courses you would like to take at the university/program you are applying to. It's okay to base your list on current year course offerings – we are looking for general academic fit only at this point. Make sure to check the academic requirements, minimum/maximum number of courses, and restrictions in the “**Academic Information**” tab of each program page.
 - List the courses by NAME
 - Include number and credits/units if available
 - List at least **double** the courses/credits that you intend to take. This will be useful in case of timetable conflicts or if a course fills up
3. **Photo**: This can be taken with a cell phone. Professional photos are not required. The photo should be in colour, focussed on your face, and not be blurry or out of focus. This photo is a perfect example of what you should aim to have →
 - **Photo must be in jpg or gif format**
 - **Photo cannot exceed 1 MB in size**



Supporting Documents

Some programs might require additional documents. These will be listed in the “**How to apply**” section of the program page. These documents might include:

1. **Academic reference letter(s)** (if applicable). We do **not** require a reference letter for your RAISA application, but some programs will require one to be submitted with the program application. Some programs may require more than one letter as well. Check the “**How to apply**” section of the program page to see what your program requires. Here you can find the [Reference Guide](#) details and instructions.
2. **Official transcripts from other post-secondary institution you’ve attended** (if applicable). *Please, do **not** submit your UCalgary transcripts at this time.* Have other transcripts (if applicable) sent to the following address:

3. **Any other supporting documents that might be required for the programs you’re applying to** (if applicable). Check the “**How to Apply**” section of each program page.

How To Submit Your Application

1. First **create a profile on RAISA**
2. Click the “**Study Programs**” tab
3. Search for and select your first program
4. Fill out and save your program application
5. Search for and select a second program. You can copy over your existing application and just modify your course list and statement of purpose.
6. Once you start to “**submit**” your program applications, you’ll be able to rank programs in the same semester.
7. **Apply for up to 3 programs** – be sure to rank them in order of preference!

Why apply for 3 programs?

Applying for only one program means that if you aren’t selected for that program, we can’t offer you a spot on another. For a small handful of students (with certain academic restrictions) this may be the only option, but for all other students we highly recommend applying to three programs. You’ll have the option to rank your choices when you submit your applications.

After You Submit Your Application

All applicants will be contacted by email whether or not they are eligible to move on to the next phase of the application process within 3-4 weeks following the priority deadline. The priority deadline is typically at the end of the second week of January, so you can expect to hear back by early-to-mid February.

After the priority round period, applications will be reviewed on a rolling application deadline where we accept applications on a first come, first considered basis. If you have submitted your application during this period, you can expect to hear back within 1-2 weeks of submitting your complete application package.

If you have not received an email from our office within the specified timeframes above, please contact study.abroad@ucalgary.ca.

Programs will remain open until they have met their maximum number of spots or passed the nomination deadline with our partner. The program page will inform you if we are still accepting applications for that period or if it is closed.

Build Your Budget

It is important to make a realistic financial plan for your time abroad. This can be done by looking at the “**Cost and Funding**” section on our program pages, checking out your host institution’s website, reading travel guides, doing online searches (e.g., *google flights*), and speaking with past and present study abroad program participants. We have peer advising and campus Ambassadors that would be happy to talk to you about how they prepared!

Prepare to Live Abroad

Preparing for your time abroad is little like training for a marathon – you can only get out of the experience what you put into it. It is important to learn as much as you can about the local culture, language, media, etc. Locals will often appreciate your efforts to speak their language. The more you know, the better prepared you’ll be. Please note, some programs require a B2 language level to apply.

- [Take a ContEd course](#) – courses offered include Spanish, French, Dutch, German, Italian, Japanese, Korean, Mandarin, Arabic, Portuguese, Russian, and ASL.
- [Join a Language Meetup](#) – Meetup.com has a variety of cultural groups and several language groups in Calgary practicing Spanish, French, German, Japanese, Russian, Italian, Mandarin, Korean, Esperanto, Portuguese, Scottish Gaelic, etc.
- Calgary has over 29 cultural associations including [The Calgary Italian Cultural Centre](#), [The Calgary Chinese Cultural Centre](#), and [Alliance Française of Calgary](#). Some of these associations offer language programs, film nights, or other social events!

Important Questions to Consider

Are the places/programs you're applying a good match for your lifestyle? If you're unsure, don't hesitate to reach out to your Global Learning Advisor to see if it will be a good fit for you. Here are some questions to consider:

- ➔ Will the local culture or university environment be suitable to support your mental/physical health needs?
- ➔ What kinds of accessibility accommodations are available?
- ➔ Will you have access to see a counsellor or doctor while you're abroad?
- ➔ Are there other resources or additional off-campus support?
- ➔ If you take medications, will they be legal there?
- ➔ Do you have allergies and a plan to manage them while abroad?
- ➔ Is the location suitable for your dietary restrictions?

Many of these questions can be answered by exploring the pages of the host university. We encourage you to be proactive and do your research ahead of meeting with your advisor to see what resources are available.

Prepare a Self-Care Kit

As much as going abroad can be an amazing, life-changing experience, you're going to be in a new environment, surrounded by new people, and likely in a new time zone, away from family and friends. At times you may feel homesick, stressed, or you may have something come up at home while you're away, and you'll want to have a plan in place to help you combat these challenges. You may be asked about your coping methods during your interview (if required).

Self-Care Guide

We encourage you to fill in this table to help strategize ways to best take care of yourself and manage your stress while abroad.

Housing, Residency and Visa Questions

Please note that your housing and residence will be handled by your host university and your incoming advisor there. We can share some resources for questions relating to these items, but most of your questions will be answered by your incoming advisor at your host university after you receive your acceptance letter. This includes the process for applying for student visas or permits (if required).

Your Global Learning Advisor will have limited ability to advise on the specifics of visa or permit processes for other countries. You will likely be directed to contact the embassy or consulate of the country you are travelling to, or you will be asked to direct your questions to the incoming advisor at your host university.

If you are having trouble connecting or finding the information you need, you are still encouraged to contact your Global Learning Advisor at study.abroad@ucalgary.ca and we will assist you in finding the correct contacts and resources, or let you know when to expect information from your host institution depending on your stage of the application.

Frequently Asked Questions

Q: My program requires a reference letter. How do I go about getting one?

A: Here are some tips for reaching out to your professor:

1. **Request your reference early.** Some professors max out the number of references they will write, so ask them as soon as you can.
2. **Supply them with your Statement of Purpose, and perhaps your resume.** This helps professors teaching large classes get a sense of who you are, your accomplishments, and your academic, personal, and professional goals.
3. **Visit them during office hours.** Whether you had a virtual class or a large class that made it difficult to meet your professor, a good idea is to meet during their office hours so they can get to know you and your aims a bit better. They might feel more comfortable writing a letter for someone willing to take the initiative to discuss with them
4. **Thank them for writing you a letter!** Faculty members have a lot of work and research to manage, so a little appreciation goes a long way – especially if you may need to ask them for another letter in the future! A great tip is to send them a thank-you postcard while you're abroad.



Q: Do I need a different reference for each program I apply to?

A: No, you only need to submit a reference letter for your program(s) that require one. If you are applying to multiple programs that need a reference letter, you can use the same one for all of them. The exception to this would be for programs that require two reference letters.

Q: Can I submit a non-academic reference?

A: The main reference you submit must be from an instructor from the University of Calgary. If you are a transfer student and would prefer to use an academic reference from your previous institution, then an exception can be made. Please contact your Global Learning advisor at study.abroad@ucalgary.ca to explain the situation.

If you want to submit supplemental references from non-academic reference, you are welcome to do so as long as your academic reference is the primary one you are using. Supplemental references are not required.

Q: Where is the Global Learning office?

A: We are in MacKimmie Tower, room 501. We anticipate moving to a new location in Science B during the Winter of 2023 (date TBD), so email us at study.abroad@ucalgary.ca to confirm our location.

If you are a business student, please note the [Haskayne exchange advisors](#) are located in Scurfield hall.

Q: What will help make my application stand out from the other applications?

A: Be sure to read instructions and resources fully before applying and ensure your application is complete with correct spelling, proper grammar, and good formatting. This shows that you have put effort into your application.

We also want to see that you have done your research, so knowing something about the programs you're applying to, and culture(s) of the places you're planning to go to will be helpful throughout your program.

After that, **we're looking for candidates who exhibit a wide range of skills** – some key ones being flexibility, tolerance for ambiguity, open-mindedness, resiliency, communication, self-reliance, and of course, a good sense of humour! You don't need to have international experience before you go but if you can relate to the challenges of being abroad by showing how you've adapted to challenges here, that will help. Explaining how this experience will impact you is a good suggestion.

Q: What other things can I prepare?

A: Make sure your passport is up to date. It will most likely be required as part of your host university application or visa application. Your passport should be valid for at least 6-8 months *after* your planned return to Canada.
