OVERVIEW

THEORY


We employed an intersectional lens to navigate the nuance of older newcomers (gender, race, age AND more).


OLDER NEWCOMERS IN CANADA

2011 National Household Survey reported **4.5 million older adults** were born outside of Canada.


HOMELESSNESS IN OLDER NEWCOMERS
